# Operational Policy for The Extraction Of Consolidated Rock With The Use Of Explosives

### **Operational Policy:**

Any extraction of consolidated rock with the use of explosives may be subject to an Approval to Operate issued under the *Air Quality Regulation - Clean Air Act*.

Definitions:

Aggregate Processing: crushing, screening, sorting, and/or washing of consolidated rock

Construction Blast: the extraction of consolidated rock with the use of explosives for the immediate

purpose of constructing infrastructure networks and/or

residential/commercial/industrial developments with no aggregate processing

Quarry: the extraction of consolidated rock with the use of explosives and includes

aggregate processing, but is not considered a construction blast

Wayside Quarry: a site within or immediately adjacent to the right-of-way of a roadway, that

removes consolidated rock with the use of explosives solely for use in the

construction of the roadway

#### Application:

Anyone contemplating the extraction of consolidated rock with the use of explosives shall contact the nearest New Brunswick Department of Environment and Local Government Regional Office.

All applications for the extraction of consolidated rock with the use of explosives will be reviewed by the Regional Engineer to determine the need for an Approval to Operate.

**Note:** All aggregate processing that has a direct discharge to a watercourse will require an Approval to Operate issued under the *Water Quality Regulation - Clean Environment Act*.

#### Exemptions:

A construction blast and/or wayside quarry do not require an Approval to Operate and do not need to be reviewed by the Department. If there are any questions about the nature of the blast, the Regional Office should be contacted for clarification.
