

WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT

Reporting period: October 25 to October 31 2020 (week 44)

Summary

In New Brunswick, influenza activity remained at inter-seasonal levels in week 44

New Brunswick:

- There have been no positive influenza cases in week 44. Since the beginning of the new season, no cases have been reported.
- There has been no new influenza associated hospitalizations during week 44. Since the beginning of the season, no hospitalizations have been reported.
- The ILI consultation rate was 0.0 per 1,000 patients visits for week 44. The ILI rate was slightly lower than the expected levels for this time of year.
- No influenza outbreaks were reported in week 44. So far this season, no influenza outbreaks have been reported.

Canada:

- Testing for influenza continues at elevated levels; however, influenza activity remains below average for this time of year. One jurisdiction reported sporadic influenza activity; no influenza or influenza-like-illness (ILI) outbreaks were reported.
- Eight laboratory detections of influenza were reported in week 44; these detections were associated with recent live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV) receipt and likely represent vaccine-type virus rather than community circulation of seasonal influenza viruses.
- 11,911 participants reported to FluWatchers and 28 (0.24%) participants reported cough and fever.
- Influenza surveillance indicators may be influenced by the COVID-19 pandemic, including changes in healthcare-seeking behaviour, impacts of public health measures and influenza testing capacity. Current data should be interpreted with consideration to this context.

International:

Seasonal influenza:

The current influenza surveillance data should be interpreted with caution as the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic have influenced to varying extents health seeking behaviours, staffing/routines in sentinel sites, as well as testing priorities and capacities in Member States. The various hygiene and physical distancing measures implemented by Member States to reduce SARS-CoV-2 virus transmission have likely played a role in reducing influenza virus transmission. Globally, despite continued or even increased testing for influenza in some countries, influenza activity remained at lower levels than expected for this time of the year. In the temperate zone of the northern hemisphere, influenza activity remained below interseasonal levels, though sporadic influenza detections were reported in some countries. In the temperate zones of the southern hemisphere, no influenza detections were reported across countries. In the Caribbean and Central American countries, sporadic influenza detections were reported. Severe acute respiratory infection (SARI) activity, likely due to COVID-19, decreased in most reporting countries. In tropical South America, there were no influenza detections across reporting countries. In tropical Africa, influenza activity was reported in West Africa in Côte d'Ivoire and Niger, and in East Africa in Kenya. In Southern Asia, influenza activity of predominately influenza A(H3N2) was reported in Bangladesh and India in recent weeks. In South East Asia, influenza detections continued to be reported in Cambodia and Lao People's Democratic Republic (PDR). Worldwide, of the very low numbers of detections.

Emerging Respiratory Viruses:

- <u>COVID-19</u>: On December 31, 2019, a cluster of cases of pneumonia was reported in Wuhan, China, and the cause has been confirmed as a new coronavirus that has not previously been identified in humans (COVID-19). As of November 10, 2020, 273,037 cases of COVID-19 infection in Canada have been identified with 10,632 deaths. Three hundred and fifty-five cases have been identified in New Brunswick with 6 deaths. 

¹ Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN) practitioners, which are comprised of sites in Emergency Rooms, in Family Practice, in First Nations communities, in Nursing Home, in Universities and in Community Health Centers. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic

- Since the beginning of the season, no influenza cases have been reported.



³ <u>No activity</u> is defined as no laboratory-confirmed influenza detections in the reporting week, however, sporadically occurring ILI may be reported. <u>Sporadic activity</u> is defined as sporadically occurring ILI and lab confirmed influenza detection(s) with no outbreaks detected within the influenza surveillance region.

Localized activity is defined as evidence of increased ILI with lab confirmed influenza detection(s) and outbreaks in schools, hospitals, residential institutions and/or other types of facilities occurring in less than 50% of the influenza surveillance region.


<u>Widespread activity</u> is defined as evidence of increased ILI with lab confirmed influenza detection(s) and outbreaks in schools, hospitals, residential institutions and/or other types of facilities occurring in greater than or equal to 50% of the influenza surveillance region.

2) ILI Consultation Rates⁴

- For week 44, the ILI consultation rate was 0.0 consultations per 1,000 patients visits. The ILI rate was slightly lower than the expected levels for this time of year.
- During week 44, the sentinel response rate was 29% for both the FluWatch sentinel physicians and the NB SPIN practitioners.

* The mean rate was based on data from the 1996/97 to 2019/2020 seasons and excludes the Pandemic season (2009/10).





*During this influenza season, 2020-2021, the number of ILI outbreaks in school (based on greater than 10% absenteeism in school due to ILI symptoms, which for many schools cannot be determined) will likely be skewed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the prudence of parents/guardians to send their children to school and their interpretation of the home isolation requirements. Therefore, the number of ILI outbreaks in schools should be interpreted with caution and should not be compared to previous seasons.






⁵ Two or more ILI cases within a seven day period, including at least one laboratory-confirmed case of influenza. Outbreaks are reported in the week when laboratory confirmation is received.

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⁷ Hospitalizations (including ICU admissions) are influenza associated; they may or may not be due to influenza.

⁸ Deaths are influenza associated; influenza may not be the direct cause of death.

⁹ In early January 2014, the Office of the Chief Medical Officer of Health implemented a new provincial surveillance system in collaboration with the Regional Health Authorities to monitor influenza-associated hospitalizations, intensive care unit admissions and deaths. A standardized Enhanced Surveillance Form is used to collect data on hospitalizations.
