#### **WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT**

Reporting period: October 25 – October 31, 2009 (week 43)
Week 35 marked the start of the 2009-2010 Influenza Season

# 1) Overall Influenza Summary-Week 43

The overall influenza activity in New Brunswick has increased significantly in week 43. Three hundred and ninety-eight positive lab results were reported during the current week; 394 pandemic (H1N1) specimens and 4 influenza A specimens pending further testing. Of the 394 positive pandemic (H1N1) lab results, 79% were individuals between 0 to 19 years of age. Five hospitalizations related to Pandemic (H1N1) was reported during week 43, from Region 1 & 3.

There were 12 outbreaks reported; none reported in nursing homes, 11 outbreaks of ILI were reported in schools in all Regions (except Region 5) and 1 outbreak reported in a correctional facility in Region 1 . The NB ILI consultation rate was also significantly higher (97.3 consultations per 1,000 patient visits) compared to last week (44.9 consultations per 1,000 patients visits)and above the expected range for this time of year. Five regions reported localized activity (R1, R2, R3, R4 and R6), one region reported sporadic activity (R5), while one region reported no activity (R7).

## 2) Influenza Laboratory Data

Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN) practitioners, which are comprised of 1 site in Urgent Care, 8 sites in Emergency Rooms, 7 sites in Family Practice, 3 sites in First Nations communities, 1 site in a Nursing Home, 4 sites in Universities and 10 sites in Community Health Centres. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic specimens. All laboratory specimens are tested using a real-time PCR assay, which is a rapid detection method designed for detection of all known variants of influenza A and B. All laboratory-confirmed cases are reported for the week when laboratory confirmation was received.

\*[Week 41 to week 34 constitutes the 2008/2009 season and week 35 marks the start of season 2009/2010]



### 3) ILI Consultation Rates


A total of 34 practitioner sites (9 FluWatch sentinel physicians and 25 NB SPIN sites) are recruited this season to report the number of ILI patients and total patient consultations one day during a reporting week.

17 practitioner sites (6 FluWatch and 11 NB SPIN) reported a total of 57 cases of ILI of the 586 patients seen for any reason during this reporting period

This week, the ILI consultation rate was 97.3 consultations per 1,000 patient visits which is a significant increase from last week. The sentinel response rate was 67% for the FluWatch sentinel physicians and 44% for the NB SPIN practitioners.


