

WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT

Reporting period: July 29, 2012 - August 11, 2012 (weeks 31 & 32)

Summary

In New Brunswick, influenza activity has returned to typical inter-seasonal levels

New Brunswick:

- There have been no positive influenza detections during weeks 31 & 32.
- The ILI consultation rates were low and were within the expected range for this time of year.
- No ILI or influenza outbreaks were reported.

Canada:

- Overall influenza activity in Canada remains low and is at inter-seasonal levels.
- 9 laboratory detections of influenza were reported, proportion of positive tests was 0.6% and 0.3% in weeks 31 & 32 respectively.
- The ILI consultation rate was within the expected levels for this time of year. No new ILI or influenza outbreaks were reported during this period.

International:

• United States: From July 12 to August 16, 2012, a total of 224 infections with influenza A (H3N2) variant viruses have been reported in 8 states (Hawaii [1], Illinois [3], Indiana [138], Michigan [1], Ohio [72], Pennsylvania [4], West Virginia [3], and Wisconsin [2]). So far during the current outbreaks, eight confirmed cases have been hospitalized as a result of their illness; no deaths have occurred. At this time no ongoing human-to-human transmission has been identified and all cases have reported contact with swine prior to illness onset. No such cases have been reported in Canada.


<u>Note:</u> While influenza surveillance continues to be monitored weekly at provincial and national levels, reporting will occur on a biweekly basis during the summer season.

1) <u>Influenza Laboratory Data¹</u>

- Influenza activity has returned to typical inter-seasonal levels.
- No influenza detections were reported during that period.
- Since the beginning of the season, 326 positive influenza detections have been reported; 37 were influenza A (H1N1)pdm09 (11%), 30 were influenza A (H3)(9%) and 259 were influenza B viruses(80%).

Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN) practitioners, which are comprised of 7 sites in Emergency Rooms, 5 sites in Family Practice, 3 sites in First Nations communities, 1 site in a Nursing Home, 3 sites in Universities and 8 sites in Community Health Centers. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic specimens. All laboratory specimens are tested using a real-time PCR assay, which is a rapid detection method designed for detection of all known variants of influenza A and B. All laboratory-confirmed cases are reported for the week when laboratory confirmation was received.



2) ILI Consultation Rates³

- During week 32, the ILI consultation rate was 10.6 consultations per 1,000 patient visits, and was within the expected levels for this time of year.
- During week 32, the sentinel response rate was 21% for the FluWatch sentinel physicians and 22% for the NB SPIN practitioners. (3 FluWatch and 4 NB SPIN)



² The National FluWatch definition of an ILI outbreak in a school is stated as absenteeism greater than 10% (or absenteeism that is higher (e.g.>5-10%) than expected level as determined by school or Public Health Authority) which is likely due to ILI.
