

WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT

Reporting period: March 5 to March 11 2017 (week 10)

Summary:

In New Brunswick, most influenza indicators remained elevated in week 10

New Brunswick:

- There have been 96 positive influenza detections in week 10. To date this season, 730 influenza detections have been reported, 129 influenza A (H3), 594 influenza A (unsubtyped), 1 influenza A (H1N1)pdm09 and 6 influenza B.
- There have been 24 influenza associated hospitalizations during week 10. So far this season, 205 influenza associated hospitalizations were reported with 9 deaths.
- The ILI consultation rate was 7.0 consultations per 1,000 patients visits, and was lower than the expected levels for this time of year.
- One new influenza outbreak was reported in a hospital.

Canada:

- Overall, the decline in influenza activity in Canada has been slow compared to previous seasons. Many parts of Canada, particularly in the Eastern and Atlantic regions are still reporting elevated activity.
- Widespread or localized influenza activity was reported in 23 regions across 6 provinces.
- Laboratory detections, influenza-like illness and outbreaks from participating provinces and territories and sentinel networks decreased from the
 previous week.
- Influenza B activity in Canada is slowly increasing but remain below what has been observed in previous seasons.
- The majority of laboratory detections, hospitalizations and deaths have been among adults aged 65+ years.
- A(H3N2) continues to be the most common subtype of influenza affecting Canadians.

International:

Seasonal influenza:

• Influenza activity in the temperate zone of the northern hemisphere appeared to decrease. Influenza activity in many countries especially in East Asia and Europe already peaked. Worldwide, influenza A(H3N2) virus was predominant. In South Asia influenza activity with mainly H1N1 has been increasing. The majority of influenza viruses characterized so far were similar antigenically to the reference viruses contained in vaccines for use in the 2016-2017 northern hemisphere influenza season.



1) Influenza Laboratory Data¹

- Most influenza indicators remained elevated in week 10.
- Ninety-six influenza detections were reported during week 10.
- Since the beginning of the season, 730 influenza detections were reported, 129 influenza A (H3), 594 influenza A (unsubtyped), 1 influenza A (H1N1)pdm09 and 6 influenza B.

¹ Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN) practitioners, which are comprised of sites in Emergency Rooms, in Family Practice, in First Nations communities, in Nursing Home, in Universities and in Community Health Centers. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic specimens. All laboratory specimens are tested using a real-time PCR assay, which is a rapid detection method designed for detection of all known variants of influenza A and B. All laboratory-confirmed cases are reported for the week when laboratory confirmation was received.



2) ILI Consultation Rates³

- During week 10, the ILI consultation rate was 7.0 consultations per 1,000 patients visits, and was lower than the expected levels for this time of year.
- During week 10, the sentinel response rate was 37% for both the FluWatch sentinel physicians and the NB SPIN practitioners.





⁸ In early January 2014, the Office of the Chief Medical Officer of Health implemented a new provincial surveillance system in collaboration with the Regional Health Authorities to monitor influenza-associated hospitalizations, intensive care unit admissions and deaths.
